## AMBROSE B. MANNIX DIES EARLY TODAY

Former County Treasurer And  
City Councilman Ill For  
Three Weeks

Ambrose B. Mannix 81, former county treasurer and member of city council, died at his home 323 Porter N. E., this morning at 5, after an illness of three weeks.

A native of Boston, Mass., where he was born Oct. 11, 1850, Mr. Mannix came to Vienna this county over a half century ago and since that time had made his home in Trumbull county. About 23 years ago he moved to Warren where he has since resided.

When he was a small boy his parents moved from Boston to New York state where Mr. Mannix received his early education. At the age of 20 he became interested in drilling operations and for two years followed this occupation. When he was 23 years old he came to Vienna and entered the employ of the Andrews Coal company. For a number of years he was in the butcher business in Liberty and Vienna townships. Later he engaged in the general merchandising business in Vienna.

In 1908 Mr. Mannix was elected county treasurer a position he held for two terms. At the close of his second term as treasurer he went into the grocery business here with C. J. Alderman the firm name being Mannix and Alderman. Later he retired.

About ten years ago he was elected councilman from the second ward a position he held for four years.

Mr. Mannix was interested in civic affairs and during his terms as city councilman he gave a great deal of his time to the work and was conscientious in his duties. He was a man with a wide acquaintance thruout the city and county and was popular with those who knew him.

In 1882 he married Miss Carrie Chamberlin of Vienna. Mrs. Mannix died several years ago.

In politics he was a staunch Republican and in his younger days took an active part in that party's work thruout the county. His neighbors in Vienna honored him with several township offices, and his county and city of Warren also showed their faith in him by selecting him to office.

Mr. Mannix was a man of kind disposition, considerate of others and always ready to lend a helping hand wherever possible.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church and all the local Masonic bodies.

Surviving is one brother, William Mannix of Molone, N. Y.

Funeral services will be held at the McFarland and Sons Funeral Home, Wednesday at 2 in charge of Rev. F. P. Reinhold and the Knights Templar. Burial will be made in the Vienna cemetery.
